

Why We Celebrate Juneteenth

Juneteenth is a special holiday in the United States. It celebrates freedom and the end of slavery in America. The word "Juneteenth" comes from June 19, 1865. That is the day when many people in Texas finally learned they were free.

Let's go back in time. For many years, millions of people were enslaved in the United States. They were taken from Africa and forced to work on farms and in homes. They had no rights. They could not go where they wanted or live free lives. It was a terrible time in American history.

In 1863, during the Civil War, President Abraham Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation. This was a law that said all enslaved people in the Southern states were now free. But not everyone heard the news. There were no cell phones, no TV, and no internet. Many slave owners in the South kept the news a secret.

More than two years later, on June 19, 1865, Union soldiers arrived in Galveston, Texas. General Gordon Granger told the people that slavery had ended. That day became known as Juneteenth — the day when freedom finally reached everyone.

After that, people started to celebrate every year. Families and communities came together to remember their history. They had parades, music, food, and speeches. Juneteenth became a symbol of hope, justice, and freedom.

In 2021, Juneteenth became an official federal holiday in the United States. Now, people across the country celebrate it, not just in Texas.

Juneteenth is more than a party. It is a time to learn, to remember, and to honor those who fought for freedom. It teaches us that everyone deserves equal rights, and that we must never forget the past.
